The Anthropocene imposes a pressing need to reframe law and governance so as above all to advance toward a mutually enhancing human-Earth relationship, with rigorous reliance on contemporary science and traditional knowledge systems. Four core themes have emerged within the project:

1. Property, loss of commons, national sovereignty and other core problematic issues of law and governance in the current dominant paradigm
2. Innovative legal frameworks and mechanisms to address Anthropocene challenges related to these core issues
3. Intergenerational, intragenerational and interspecies equity – justice in the Anthropocene
4. Role of law in multi-scale social transformation toward a mutually enhancing human-Earth relationship
